Appointment to the faculty of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology of three associate professors, one visiting associate professor, and six assistant professors was announced today by Dr. James R. Killian, Jr., President of the Institute.

Those appointed associate professors effective July 1st are--

Dr. Raymond A. Bauer, a staff member of M. I. T. 's Center for International Studies, and author of two books on Soviet-Russian social psychology, "The New Man in Soviet Psychology" and "Nine Soviet Portraits." Dr. Bauer, who has been appointed to the Department of Economics and Social Science, is a graduate of Northwestern University, and served during World War II as Russian Language Officer in the USNR. He received the degree of doctor of philosophy in 1950 at Harvard University, where in recent years he has been co-director of research for the Harvard Project on the Soviet Social System; a lecturer in social psychology; and field director of the Harvard Refugee Interview Project conducted in Europe during 1950-51.

Dr. Alberto P. Calderon, named associate professor in M. I. T. 's Department of Mathematics, has been a member of the Institute for Advanced Study

(Princeton, N. J.) since 1953, while on leave of absence from his associate professorship at Ohio State University. Dr. Calderon received the degree of civil engineer (1946) at the University of Buenos Aires, where he later served as assistant professor, and the degree of doctor of philosophy (1950) at the University of Chicago.

Dr. John F. Elliott, appointed to the Department of Metallurgy, was awarded the degrees of bachelor of metallurgical engineering at the University of Minnesota in 1942, and doctor of science at M. I. T. in 1949. After two years as a research metallurgist in the U. S. Steel Corporation Research Laboratories, Dr. Elliott joined the staff of Inland Steel Company, where he is assistant superintendant of the Open Hearth and Blooming Mill Division, Quality Control Department. He received the Robert W. Hunt Medal and Award (1952) of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers and is chairman of its Committee on the Physical Chemistry of Steelmaking, a subject on which he has published numerous articles.

Appointed visiting associate professor in the Department of Electrical Engineering, Edwin W. Rogers will come to M. I. T. in September from the University of Washington, where he has been a member of the teaching staff since 1946 and received the degree of master of science in 1948. He was graduated in 1934 from the University of California, is a registered professional engineer, and during his World War II service as Lieutenant Commander, USNR, organized the training program at M. I. T. 's Radiation Laboratory.

Six assistant professors will assume their posts on July 1st:

Dr. Ingo Ingenohl, appointed to M. I. T. 's School of Industrial Management, was graduated from the Technical University in Berlin-Charlottenburg, Germany

(B. Sc. and M. Sc. in civil engineering, 1939; Ph. D. in industrial engineering and industrial psychology, 1943). After escaping from Germany, he held civil and industrial engineering positions in both Denmark and Canada.

Dr. James D. Koerner, an assistant professor at Kansas State College since 1952, has been named assistant professor of English in M. I. T.'s Department of Humanities and Social Studies, where he was a Visiting Ford Fellow in 1954-55. Dr. Koerner holds three degrees from Washington University in St. Louis (B. A., 1947; M. A., 1949; and Ph. D., 1952).

Dr. Edwin Kuh, a member of the Trade Division, ECA Mission to the United Kingdom (1949-50), and the President's Materials Policy Commission (1951), has held teaching posts at Clark, Harvard, and Johns Hopkins universities. He was graduated from Williams College (1949), and Harvard University (Ph. D., 1954), and will join the M. I. T. School of Industrial Management.

Dr. Theodore P. Lockwood, named assistant professor of history in the Department of Humanities and Social Studies, is a graduate of Trinity College and received his M. A. (1950) and Ph. D. (1952) at Princeton University. In 1953, after a year as instructor at Dartmouth College, he was appointed assistant professor at Guniata College in Huntingdon, Pennsylvania.

Henry M. Morgan, a graduate of M. I. T. (S. B., 1948; S. M., 1955), has been appointed to the Department of Mechanical Engineering, in which he is currently working for his doctorate in textile technology. Mr. Morgan is senior research associate with Fabric Research Laboratories, Inc.

Dr. Warren S. Torgerson, research associate for the Educational Testing Service and the Social Science Research Council's Committee on Scaling, has
