Dean George R. Harrison today announced fifteen faculty promotions in the School of Science at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

On July 1, the following will assume full professorships:

Dr. Warren Ambrose of Brookline, associate professor of mathematics. Before he joined the M.I.T. faculty ten years ago, Dr. Ambrose was associated with the Institute for Advanced Study, the Universities of Alabama and Michigan, and Princeton and Yale Universities. He received his B.S., M.S., and Ph.D. at the University of Illinois.

Dr. Bernard T. Feld of Cambridge, associate professor of physics. Dr. Feld, who holds a B.S. from the College of the City of New York and a Ph.D. from Columbia University, served as physicist at the University of Chicago's Metallurgical Laboratory and at the University of California's Los Alamos Laboratory prior to his M.I.T. appointment in 1945.

Dr. George W. Whitehead of Arlington, associate professor of mathematics. Dr. Whitehead received his S.B., S.M., and Ph.D. at the University of Chicago. Formerly a teacher and mathematician at Purdue University, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Princeton University, and Brown University, he has been on the M.I.T. faculty since 1949.

Dr. Nesmith C. Ankeny of Chestnut Hill, assistant professor of mathematics. At M.I.T. since 1955, he was previously an O.N.R. Fellow at Princeton and the Institute for Advanced Study and an assistant professor at Johns Hopkins University. He holds a B.S. from Stanford University and a Ph.D. from Princeton.

Dr. William H. Dennen of Lexington, assistant professor of geology. Awarded his S.B. and Ph.D. at M.I.T., Dr. Dennen has been a member of the Institute staff since 1946, when he completed World War II service as captain in the U.S. Marines.

Dr. William L. Kraushaar of Concord, assistant professor of physics. A specialist in cosmic ray research, he had been on the staffs of the National Bureau of Standards and the M.I.T. Division of Industrial Cooperation until 1951. He holds a B.S. from Lafayette College and a Ph.D. from Cornell University.

Dr. John F. Nash, Jr., assistant professor of mathematics. He is currently at the Institute for Advanced Study, on leave from M.I.T. Dr. Nash received his B.S. and M.S. at Carnegie Institute of Technology and his Ph.D. at Princeton University, where he also served as instructor. He was appointed C.L.E. Moore Instructor in physics at M.I.T. in 1951.

Dr. Norman A. Phillips of Lexington, research associate in meteorology. Dr. Phillips was awarded his bachelor's, master's, and doctor's degrees by the University of Chicago. He had been meteorologist at the Institute for Advanced Study for five years before joining the M.I.T. staff in 1956.

Dr. Stanley E. Charm of Newton, food technology. He holds bachelor's degrees from the University of Massachusetts and M.I.T., a master's degree from Washington State College, and a doctorate from M.I.T., where his first staff appointment was with the Division of Industrial Cooperation in 1953.

Dr. F. Albert Cotton of Boston, chemistry. An instructor at M.I.T. since 1955, he received his A.B. at Temple University and his Ph.D. at Harvard.

Dr. George J. Fuld of Wakefield, food technology. Awarded an S.B. and Sc.D. at M.I.T., he has been an instructor at the Institute for the past two years.

Dr. Edward Herbert of Arlington, biology. He was graduated from the University of Connecticut and received his Ph.D. at the University of Pennsylvania, teaching there and at the University of Wisconsin before he came to M.I.T. in 1955.

Dr. William R. Moore of Belmont, chemistry. On the M.I.T. staff since 1954, he holds a B.S. from the University of California at Los Angeles and a Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota.

Dr. Robert A. Schluter of Cambridge, physics. Formerly on the staff of the Institute for Nuclear Studies, University of Chicago, where he received his B.S. and Ph.D., Dr. Schluter has been an instructor at M.I.T. since 1955.

Dr. Nathan S. Wall of Waltham, physics. He was graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and received his Ph.D. at M.I.T., where he was first appointed to the research and teaching staff in 1949.
