General James H. Doolittle, vice president of the Shell Oil Company, and Clarence D. Howe, chancellor of Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia, have been elected life members of the Corporation of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Both have been Alumni Term Members of the Corporation since 1953.

Acting President J. A. Stratton also announced the election of five new Corporation term members, each to serve for five years. They are:

Donald W. Douglas '14, chairman of the board of Douglas Aircraft Company in Santa Monica, Calif. A member and former president of the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences, Mr. Douglas is also former chairman of the board of governors for the Aircraft Industries Association and board member of the National Industrial Conference Board. He has been awarded the U.S. Certificate of Merit (1948), the USAF Exceptional Service Award (1953), the Elmer A. Sperry Award (1956) and the National Defense Transportation Award (1956).

Cecil H. Green '23, chairman of the Geophysical Service, Inc., in Dallas, Texas. He is vice president and director of Texas Instruments, Inc. and a director of Geophysical Service International Corp., as well as a trustee of St. Mark's School in Dallas.

Robert C. Guinness '34, executive vice president of the Standard Oil Company (Indiana) in Chicago, Ill. He is a former president of the M.I. T. Club of Chicago, and was vice chairman of the Research and Development Board of the Department of Defense (1951).

Clarence H. Linder, vice president of General Electric Company. A graduate of the University of Texas, he has been with the General Electric Company since 1924. He has been awarded the honorary degree of doctor of engineering by Worcester Polytechnic Institute and Clarkson College of Technology. Mr. Linder lives in Scarsdale, N.Y.

Gilbert M. Roddy '31, president of the Boston Manufacturers Mutual Insurance Company and Mutual Boiler and Machinery Insurance Company in Waltham, Mass. As president of the M.I.T. Alumni Association during 1957-58, he also served on the Corporation last year. He was president and director of the Emerson Hospital in Concord from 1951-57, and is currently trustee of the Boston Museum of Science and the Home Savings Bank of Boston. Mr. Roddy lives in Concord, Mass.

John J. Wilson '29, as president of the M.I.T. Alumni Association for 1958-59, will be an ex-officio member of the Corporation during his term of office. Mr. Wilson is a director of the Minneapolis-Honeywell Regulator Company, and former president and director of Doelcam Corporation and of Datamatic Corporation. From 1955 to 1957 he was vice president of the Alumni Association.

General Doolittle has been associated with Shell Oil Company since 1930 and has been vice president and director since 1946. He served with the U.S. Army from 1917-30 and from 1940-46, when, during World War II, he led the famed Tokyo Raid. Appointed Lieutenant General in 1944, he commanded the 12th Air Force in North Africa, the Strategic Air Force, and the 15th and 18th Air Forces. He also commanded the 8th Air Force in Okinawa in 1945.

General Doolittle received his bachelor of arts degree in mining engineering

from the University of California in 1918. He was awarded the degrees of Master of Science and Doctor of Science from M.I. T. in 1924 and 1925, respectively.

He was president of the Air Force Association from 1946-47 and chairman from 1948-49. He is an honorary fellow of the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences (of which he was president in 1940), a fellow of the Royal Aeronautical Society, a member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and of the Society of Automotive Engineers. His clubs include the Lynx, Lotus, and Wings of New York.

Mr. Howe has for many years been a leading public figure in Canada. He was elected in 1935 to the House of Commons and appointed Minister of Railways and Canals and Minister of Marine; in 1936 he became the first Minister of Transport. In the latter post he established the National Harbors Board, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, and Trans-Canadian Airlines, which was Canada's first transcontinental airline system. He also reorganized the administration of the Canadian National Railways.

He served on the War Supply Board in 1939 and was Minister of Munitions and Supply from 1940 to 1944. In 1946 the Department of Reconstruction and the Department of Reconstruction and Supply were merged under his direction as Minister of Reconstruction and Supply. From 1951-57, he was Minister of Defense Production and a member of the Imperial Privy Council.

A native of Waltham, Mass., Mr. Howe graduated from M.I. T. in 1907. He served as an assistant in the Department of Civil Engineering at M.I. T. for a year prior to becoming Professor of Civil Engineering at Dalhousie University in 1908.
