To Members of the Faculty:

I am happy to announce the promotion of Albert Bush-Brown to Associate Professor of Architectural History in the Department of Architecture. In addition to his courses on the history and theory of architecture in the Department of Architecture, he will take part in the visual arts program begun last year in the Humanities Department. His advanced humanities course on the history and criticism of architecture will be open to all students.

Professor Bush-Brown's articles on the growth and development of American art and architecture have appeared in several professional journals, as well as the New York Times Sunday Magazine and Harper's magazine. He is now preparing for publication a study of college and university architecture.

A native of West Hartford, Conn., Professor Bush-Brown received the bachelor and master of fine arts degrees from Princeton University. He began his teaching career as an instructor at Princeton in 1949 and during the next three years was a member of the Society of Fellows at Harvard University. Before coming to M.I.T. in 1954 he was Assistant Professor of Architecture at Western Reserve University in Cleveland. He is architecture editor for the Encyclopedia Britannica and editor of the Journal of Architectural Education.
