Dr. Richard S. Eckaus and Dr. John S. Saloma have been appointed to the faculty of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, John E. Burchard, Dean of the School of Humanities and Social Science, announced. Dr. Eckaus will be associate professor of economics and Dr. Saloma will be assistant professor of economics.

Dr. Eckaus, born April 30, 1926, in Kansas City, Mo., received a B.S. degree from Iowa State College in 1946, the M.A. degree from Washington University in 1948, and the Ph.D. degree from M.I.T. in 1954. From 1951 to 1958 he served as associate professor of economics at Brandeis University. He was a research assistant to Profs. Paul A. Samuelson and Roger V. Brown in economics at M.I.T. from 1950-51, a research associate in 1954, and in 1954 and 1955 studied economic problems in Italy for M.I.T.'s Center for International Studies. Since 1958 he has done research on the economic significance of production in undeveloped areas, sponsored by the Rockefeller Research Foundation. He is the author of several articles, including "The Stability of Dynamic Models" (1957) in the Review of Economics and Statistics, and "The Factor Proportions Problem" (1960) in the American Economic Review. He is married and lives at 18 Bates St., Cambridge, Mass.

Dr. Saloma, who specializes in British and American economic policy, received the B.S. degree from M.I.T. in 1956, and the M.A. and Ph.D. from Harvard in 1959 and 1962, respectively. While studying for his doctorate he worked on research at the London School of Economics, was a Teaching Fellow, 1960-1961, and a Congressional Fellow

of the American Political Science Association, 1961-1962. He has worked also for the Bureau of the Budget and for the International Cooperation Administration, Washington, D.C.
